DOF Fires

Munson Creek Fire, #235, Fairbanks Area, 54,050 acres, 16 personnel, Limited protection, 52 miles east of Fairbanks near Chena Hot Springs.

- Fire received 1.2 inches of rain over the weekend and minimal fire activity was reported.
- Fairbanks #1 Crew was demobilized today and will be returning to Fairbanks Area Forestry to prep for a possible Lower 48 assignment.
- Fire remains less than ¼ mile from homes/cabins between Miles 52-53 Chena Hot Springs Road.
- Evacuation level was lowered "Set" to "Ready" on Monday for the area east of Mile 48 Chena Hot Springs Road. It was raised to "Set" on Thursday due to heightened fire activity in that area.
- Hose and sprinklers will be left up around cabins and structures. If cool, wet weather persists, hose and sprinklers will be pulled later this week.
- One Fairbanks Area Forestry engine will continue to patrol the fire from the road and helicopter reconnaissance flights will be done as necessary to monitor fire activity.
- Estimated cost to date: \$2.5 million.

BLM Alaska Fire Service Fires

Marten Creek Fire #386, Upper Yukon Zone, 2,663 acres, 50 personnel, Full protection, 10 miles east of Venetie

- Fire did not receive any significant rainfall over the weekend. However, the 60-degree weather, higher humidity levels and partial cloud cover has tempered fire behavior.
- Fire was smoldering and creeping and putting up white, whispy patches of smoke with minismoke columns on Sunday.
- For the second day in a row, two water-dropping airplanes worked the southern edge of the fire Sunday to keep things cool ahead of the work firefighters are doing in the area.
- Fairbanks-based White Mountain Crew a saw line reaching from a nearby lake to the southeastern edge of the fire. They'll extend that control line west along the fire's south perimeter to a burned finger of land on the southwestern flank.
- The Tanana Chief Crew Type 2 Initial Attack Crew (T2IA) will arrive in Venetie today to joint he White Mountain Crew near the fire's perimeter. The goal is to secure a section on the southwest edge to limit the spread toward historical cabins four to six miles to the south and Venetie 10 miles to the southwest.
- The water-scooping Fire Boss airplanes are prepositioned in Fort Yukon and will likely be used again today.
- Estimated cost to date: \$791,590.

<u>Discovery Creek #388, Upper Yukon Zone, 4,528-acres, 28 personnel, Modified protection, 30 miles northwest of Venetie in Arctic National Wildlife Refuge</u>

- Fire behavior moderated significantly on Sunday as it was reportedly smoldering with some creeping along the edge in some places.
- Smokejumpers and UAF Nanooks Crew continue to protect a Native allotment at the confluence of the Chekhechunnjik Creek and the North Fork of the East Fork of the Teedriinjik (Chandalar) River.
- The fire is held up in white spruce along the northern edge of the allotment near the Chekhechunnjik Creek. Firefighters will monitor this area with a drone and wait to see what weather Mother Nature bestows on the fire area.
- Scattered showers and slightly cooler temperatures are forecasted for the next couple of days starting this evening. The light, northerly winds will switch to out of the southeast today and increase a bit tomorrow.
- Estimated cost to date: \$331,675.

More than 300 Alaska firefighting personnel in Lower 48

As of Monday, there were 304 Alaska firefighting personnel working on fires in the Lower 48.

A second strike team of 5 engines is enroute to Tacoma, Washington through the Northwest Compact to assist that state with fire suppression. The first strike team of 5 DOF engines is currently assigned to fires in Oregon. DOF firefighters to staff the second strike team of engines will be flying to Seattle on Friday to marry up with the engines.

Pioneer Peak Interagency Hotshot Crew

Working on the Bean Creek Fire in the Deschutes National Forest in Central Oregon. The fire
was reported to be 138 acres and 20% contained as of Sunday. There were 63 personnel
assigned, including 2 crews and 5 engines. A Type 3 incident management team from the
Central Oregon Fire Management Service took over command of the fire Sunday night.

Chena Interagency Hotshot Crew

• Assigned to the Devil's Knob Complex a grouping of 40+ lightning-caused fires with the majority burning on the Tiller Ranger District, Umpqua National Forest. The fires were started from thunderstorms on July 29th and August 1st. The Devil's Knob Complex is situated between the Rough Patch Complex and Jack Fire to the north, which is being managed by Northwest Incident Management Team 13 and the Skyline Ridge Complex to the southwest, which is being managed by Oregon Department of Forestry Team 1. The Devil's Knob Complex is managed by Northwest Incident Management Team 8 from an incident command post at the Milo Academy near Tiller, Oregon. As of Sunday, there were 612 personnel working on the fire, including 4 Type 1 hotshot crews, 2 Type 2 initial attack crews, 11 Type 2 crews, 36 engines, 11 dozers and 16 water tenders.

Midnight Sun Interagency Hotshot Crew

• On preposition order for Northern Rockies Coordination Center in Montana.

White Mountain Type 2IA Crew

Assigned to the 2,663-acre Marten Creek Fire 10 miles northeast of Venetie. There are 50
personnel and 2 crews assigned to the fire, which is being managed by a Type 3 organization
from the BLM Alaska Fire Service.

Gannett Glacier Type 2IA Crew

• On a preposition order for the Northern Rockies Coordination Center in Montana.

USFS R-10 Type 2IA Crew

• Currently assigned to 2,072-acre Boulder 2700 Fire 9 miles east of Polson, Montana. The fire was 31% contained as of Monday morning with 279 personnel assigned to the fire. The fire received anywhere from 0.5 to 1.4 inches of rain on Sunday. The rain event was described as a season-slowing, not season-ending event. The fire is being managed by Type 2 Northern Rockies IMT 4. The fire has burned 31 structures.

Tanana Chiefs Type 2IA Crew

• Will be assigned to the 2,663-acre Marten Creek Fire 10 miles northeast of Venetie today. They will join the White Mountain and North Star Crews on the fire, which is being managed by a Type 3 organization from the BLM Alaska Fire Service.

Yukon Type 2 Crew

• Currently assigned to 31,591-acre Harris Mountain Fire 7 miles south of Cascade, Montana. The fire was 43% contained as of Monday morning with 370 personnel assigned. Fire received 0.4 inches of rain on Sunday and fire activity was minimal due to rain and cloud cover. The fire is being managed by the Type 2 Northern Rockies Team 7 incident management team.

UAF Nanooks Type 2 Crew

• Currently assigned to 4,528-acre Discovery Creek Fire 30 miles northwest of Venetie in Upper Yukon Zone.

North Star Type 2 Crew

Assigned to the 2,663-acre Marten Creek Fire 10 miles northeast of Venetie. There are 50
personnel and 2 crews assigned to the fire, which is being managed by a Type 3 organization
from the BLM Alaska Fire Service.

Alaska Fire Weather

Rain is still falling this afternoon over much of the Tanana Valley, Fortymile Uplands, and White Mountains and west to the Lower Yukon. Cooler and showery weather will then setup over the Mainland for the next several days as a trough remains over the Mainland, sending summer back into Canada and the Lower 48. In Southcentral Alaska, expect, steady rain to spread across Kodiak Island today, then all of Southcentral tonight. The heaviest precipitation will be across the Prince William Sound region, right ahead of the upper level short-wave and in the area of best jet dynamics. The primary short-wave will quickly exit into the Yukon Tuesday morning, though additional weaker short-waves behind it will cause precipitation to linger, especially across the northern Susitna Valley and all of the Copper River Basin. Rainfall totals tonight through Tuesday will be quite a bit lighter than Sunday's event for inland areas of Southcentral, ranging from one quarter to one half inch.


SHORT-TERM FORECAST

- Cool and wet. Some breaks in between waves.
- No thunderstorms today, then slight chance Tuesday/Wednesday.
- Tonight, some moisture will start to creep into Upper Yukon, but still only low to moderate amounts.
- Drier surface fuels in the Northwest, but all deeper fuels there are quite wet.

LONG-RANGE FORECAST

- Models all in agreement in keeping cool and wet weather.
- Perhaps a brief respite over the weekend, but then a return of Southwest Flow.
- As is typical, Upper Yukon will be the last dry holdout.
