New wildfire activity

Black Hills Fire #366, Tok Area

- Reported at 2:31 p.m. Wednesday on Tetlin Village Corporation land.
- Tok Area helo flew the fire to get a size up and reported it to be approximately 56 miles southeast of Tok, in Limited protection, estimated at 57 acres with rank 4 fire behavior, burning in continuous black spruce with 10 to 12-foot flame lengths.
- No action taken and fire was placed in Monitor status.

Olympia Creek Fire #365, Fairbanks Area

- Reported by AFS helicopter returning from a mission at 10:30 p.m. Tuesday
- Estimated at 100 acres as of noon Wednesday, approx. 40 miles NE Fairbanks and 15 miles NW of Munson Creek Fire, Limited protection.
- Fairbanks Area helo flew fire Wednesday morning and reported it was mostly a ground fire creeping, backing and smoldering.
- Cabin located 2.5 miles NE of fire with two other cabins.
- 3 cabins located 3-4 miles N and SE of fire.

Ballaine Road Fire #364, Fairbanks Area

- Multiple spot fires in grass were reported along Ballaine Road off Farmers Loop at 8 p.m.
 Tuesday.
- Fairbanks Area engines, Helitack and the University Fire Department responded and found multiple fires burning alongside the road. Engines extinguished the fires with water and cold trailed them. Fires were called contained and controlled at 8:43 p.m.

Staffed fires

Munson Creek #235, Fairbanks Area

- Estimated at 44,200 acres as of Tuesday evening.
- 43 personnel assigned to fire, including White Mountain Crew and six engines patrolling Chena Hot Springs Road and checking structure protection.
- Recon flight on Wednesday evening revealed fire was threatening mining camp on Ottertail Creek along Middle Fork Chena River and helicopter will do bucket work to protect the camp.
- Fire activity has picked up in the area of Bear Paw Butte about 1 mile east of Chena Hot Springs Road near Mile 53 but fire is still held up in creek drainage and riparian area.

• Fire perimeter continues to expand into Limited protection area on the north and east.


Tanker 540 makes "splash and dash" retardant drops in Yukon

Yukon Protective Services requested assistance from DOF late Wednesday afternoon to make retardant drops on a fire burning about 20 kilometers (12 miles) southwest of Dawson. The Bell Creek Fire is approximately 37 acres. The fire is one of 11 new lightning starts reported today. The fire is on the opposite (west) side of the Yukon River from Dawson but there is a community that could be threatened if the fire advances over a ridge and creek between the community and the fire. Bird Dog 840 and Tanker 540 were dispatched out of Palmer to make retardant drops. A Yukon air tanker group and an initial attack crew are working on the fire.

DOF has a "splash and dash" agreement with Yukon Protective Services in which tankers from Alaska or the Yukon can make retardant drops on fires across the border at the request of either agency. Tanker 540 will reload and refuel at the Tanacross Tanker Base in Tok if it makes more than one retardant drop.


Smoky in Fairbanks

Tuesday marked the fifth day this summer at Fairbanks International Airport with wildfire smoke thick enough to reduce visibility less than 6 miles. As you can see in this graph, smoky days in Fairbanks have become more frequent since 2000. In several instances, that smoke has been the result of wildfires burning in Siberia that has drifted into Alaska.



Hot and dry in eastern Interior

While Northwest, Southwest, Southeast and Southcentral Alaska have received abundant rainfall over the past month to temper fire danger in those regions, that has not been the case in the eastern and central Interior. It's turned quite dry across parts of the eastern and central Interior. Rainfall for the last 30 days (June 20-July 19) at Fairbanks International Airport has totaled just 0.45", which is about one-third of normal. All that rain has come in July and the 0.45" is nearly 1 inch below normal rainfall through July 20. In addition, there have been nine days in July with a high temperature of 80 degrees or higher. There were five 80+ degree days in June for a total of 14 so far this summer. That compares to just three days with a



temperature of 80 or higher last summer, two of which were in May. There were no 80-degree days in July of last year.
