

FOREST RESOURCES

Since July 2015, reductions in state general funds to the forest resources program resulted in the loss of twelve full-time positions, ten student interns, and one position that shared funding with the forest fire program. Over the past three years, the forest resources program budget has been reduced by approximately 42%. These cuts, along with reorganization, resignations, difficulty filling vacancies, and appeals of proposed timber sales, have reduced capacity to offer state timber sales in Southeast Alaska.

Our federally-funded cooperative Forest Health, Forest Stewardship, and Community Forestry programs remain strong. The US Forest Service (USFS) Forest Inventory and Analysis Program completed its first year in Interior Alaska in partnership with the DOF, UAF, and Tanana Chiefs Conference and should continue annually.

The DOF and the USFS completed the first year of a three-year forest inventory to support a transition to young growth timber harvesting in the Tongass National Forest. The DOF and the USFS also signed an agreement allowing the DOF to prepare and administer commercial timber sales on national forest system lands in Alaska. These federally-funded agreements provide jobs and opportunities for Alaskans to develop new skills which support communities and the local timber industry.

The mission of the Division of Forestry is to proudly serve Alaskans through forest management and wildland fire protection.

WILDLAND FIRE

The Division of Forestry provides protection from wildland fire and other destructive agents relative to the values at risk on private, state, or municipal land (AS Sec.41.15.010) in a safe, efficient and cost-effective manner. The Division is responsible for managing wildland fires on 150 million acres of land located in the more densely populated areas of the state with a staff of 30 full-time and 170 seasonal employees. The Division works cooperatively with local fire departments, the BLM Alaska Fire Service, U.S. Forest Service, and hundreds of seasonal workers to minimize the impact of wildland fire on the public, property, and the natural resource values of Alaska.

Despite an early start and late finish, Alaska's 2016 wildland fire season was well below normal as a result of heavy rain in June and July in Interior Alaska. A total of 572 wildfires burned 500,949 acres in 2016, making it the 36th largest fire season on record since 1939. In a normal year, Alaska records about 500 fires that burn 1.2 million acres. Despite the below-average season, Alaska still ranked second behind California in total acres burned in a state. No structures were lost and there were no major injuries to firefighters or civilians during the 2016 season.

The season got off to an early start due to below-normal snowfall and a warm, dry spring. The first wildfire was reported on Feb. 22 near Delta Junction. Alaska Fire Service smokejumpers were deployed to their earliest fire ever in Alaska – the Leaf Lake Fire near Palmer on April 17. It also turned out to be one of the latest fire seasons on record due to dry, snow-free conditions in Southcentral Alaska in the fall. The Moose Creek Fire north of Palmer was reported on Oct. 8 and burned 303 acres near the community of Sutton.

COMMUNITY & LANDOWNER ASSISTANCE

The Community Forestry Program is funded by a federal grant to establish and enhance forest management in Alaska communities. 2016 accomplishments:

- Provided educational, technical and/or financial assistance to local governments, agencies organizations, businesses and individuals in 17 communities: Anchorage, Fairbanks, Girdwood, Homer, Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson, Juneau, Kenai, Ketchikan, Metlakatla, Palmer, Salcha, Seward, Sitka, Soldotna, Sterling, Tok, and Wasilla.
- Awarded grants to three communities and four organizations.
- Continued progress on landscape scale restoration projects to improve forest health, water quality, and fish habitat in the watersheds of the Chena River in Fairbanks and Campbell Creek in Anchorage. Projects are funded by US Forest Service grants.
- Provided educational presentations and classes to 144 individuals for a total of 450 seat hours.
- Volunteers donated 1,631 hours towards community forestry projects.

The federally-funded Forest Stewardship Program offers technical assistance to private forest landowners to develop and follow Forest Stewardship Plans written by a natural resources professional. 2016 accomplishments:

- Assisted 12 private landowners and six
 Alaska Native Corporations to prepare stewardship plans to sustainably manage their lands for a variety of objectives.
- Awarded grants to 50 landowners to reduce hazardous fuels around homes, reducing the risk of loss to wildfire.
- Partnered with the UAF

 teachers throughout the state.
